## The Topic:

Muslims believe that the words of the *Qur'an* were revealed through the agency of Archangel Gabriel to Prophet Muhammad (pbuh). Following the prohibition in the Ten Commandments, "You shall not make yourself a carved image or any likeness of anything in heaven or on earth beneath or in the waters under the earth." (Exodus 20:4), Islamic Art focused on representing the divinely-revealed words of the Qur'an, making Calligraphy the highest of all art-forms for Muslims who expressed their love and devotion to God through the immaculate beauty and superb craftsmanship of their artistic work.
