

**PROFESSOR ROBERT STENGER** is Professor Emeritus of Law at the Brandeis School of Law, University of Louisville where he taught from 1974 to 2010. Earlier, he was Chair of Philosophy and Theology at Dominican College in Racine, Wisconsin (1963-1964). He taught in the School of Religion at the University of Iowa (1967-1974). The courses he has taught at the University of Louisville include Constitutional Law I and II, Domestic Relations, Jurisprudence, Seminar on Domestic Violence, and Externship Seminar on Medicine, Bioethics and Law. He has also been a visiting professor in the United Kingdom, Germany, France, China, Australia, Japan and Finland.

He has been the Vice Chair and Chair of the Faculty Senate (1986-1990). He is a member of the Hospital Ethics Committee, University of Louisville HealthCare University Hospital, the Task Force on Human Studies and a member of the Board of Directors of the American Civil Liberties Union. He received the University of Louisville Distinguished Service Award and the University Distinguished Lifetime Service Award.

He has published widely on a wide variety of legal topics.

Professor Stenger was a member of a U.S. delegation of teachers, preachers and community activists, which traveled to Pakistan, India and Pakistan in the summer of 2004. The visit to South Asia was part of an exchange program called "*Islamic Life in the U.S.*" between South Asian Muslims and Americans which was sponsored by the U.S. Department of State through a grant awarded to the University of Louisville. This program was developed and directed by Professor Riffat Hassan and was part of an initiative launched by the U.S. Department of State in the wake of the September 11, 2001, to promote peace and understanding between Muslims of Pakistan, India and Bangladesh and Americans. Professor Stenger participated in many educational and cultural events during his visit. She also had the opportunity to meet General Pervez Musharraf, President of Pakistan, and Professor Iajuddin Ahmed, President of Bangladesh, and many other dignitaries and leaders from the cities he visited.
