

KENNETH STAMMERMAN is a Louisville native. After completing his studies through university in Louisville, he joined the U.S. Foreign Service in 1966. As a Foreign Service Officer of the U.S. Department of State, he held a number of positions overseas and in Washington at the Department of State. His foreign assignments included Tel Aviv, Israel (1967-1969, 1977-1981), Manila (The Philippines), Paris, France (1975-1977), Kuwait City, Kuwait (1987-1989), and Dhahran, Saudi Arabia (1989-1992). In Washington, he served on the Egypt Desk in the Economic Bureau (1981-1983), and was Director of Economics Training at the Foreign Service Institute (1983-1986). As a Senior Foreign Service Officer, his last foreign assignments were as Economic Counselor at our Embassy in Kuwait and as Consul General in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia during and after the First Gulf War. From 1992-1994, he was associated with the Department of Energy, Los Alamos, New Mexico where studies on weapons of mass destruction were being conducted (1992-1994).

Mr. Stammerman returned to Louisville in 1994 after his retirement from the Foreign Service. He writes and speaks on foreign policy topics, including as a member of the adjunct faculty at Indiana University Southeast (New Albany, Indiana).
