Rev. C. J. Wright (CTR, CTSS, CCISM) (Cherokee Name: **Awahili Gawoni** - She Who Talks with Eagle) of Cherokee and English heritage, is an Interfaith Minister and spiritual leader in the Kentucky Native American Community. She is the Director of the Rainbow Spiritual Education Center.

Dr. Marcia Texler Segal (M.A. Columbia University. Ph.D. Indiana University-Bloomington) Professor of Sociology and Dean for Research Emerita at I. U. S., has worked in countries in sub-Saharan Africa, Central Asia and Saudi Arabia, and is an active member of Congregation Adath Jeshuran.

Sister Kathryn Huber, OSB, is a member of Monastery Immaculate Conception and the Spirituality Ministry of the Sisters of St. Benedict of Ferdinand, IN. A vowed religious for sixty-one years, she has served as federation president, prioress, retreat minister, principal, teacher, and spiritual guide.

Dr. Riffat Hassan (B.A. Honors and Ph. D. University of Durham, England, Doctor of Humane Letters, Meadville Lombard Theological Seminary, Chicago)) Professor Emerita (U of L), pioneer of Islamic feminist theology and Jewish-Christian-Muslim dialogue, who founded *The Salaam Network* in 2016.

Moderator: Dr. Mary Hora (Ph. D. in History, University of Toronto). Has served as Senior Staff Attorney at the Kentucky Court of Appeals for the past fourteen years.

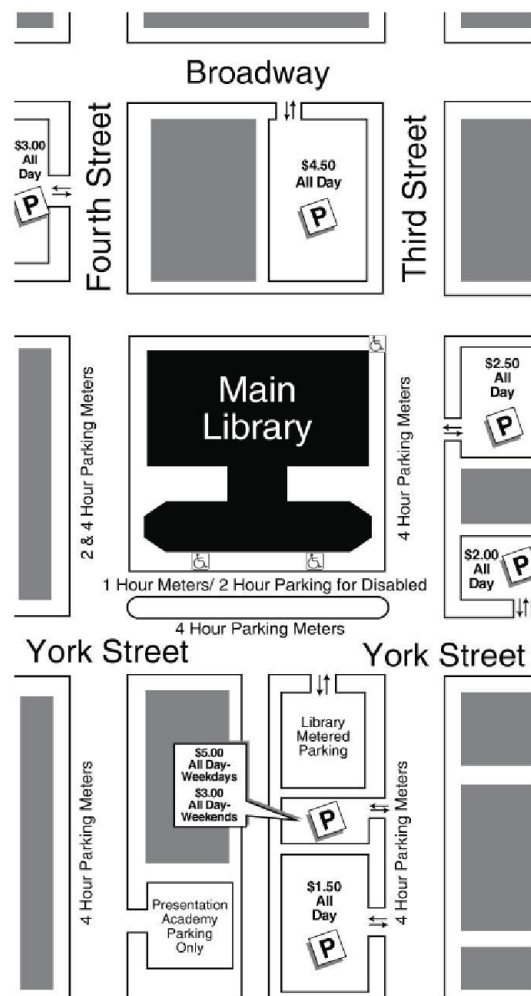
